South Africa has had a troubled history but it also has a great future. If we can all be like Ben Tengimfene and really forgive others for present and past injustices, then the 21st century will be a wonderful one for our country. This is how Ben Tengimfene wrote in his autobiography:

1. In the early 1950's I heard a Xhosa politician say: 'One man will molest/annoy a swarm of bees and they will sting everybody'. How true! As Robert Burns once wrote: 'Man's inhumanity to man makes countless people mourn.'
2. Many of us were politicians or practised politics long before organisations were banned. So, the later torturing of us to force us to admit to the most horrendous and barbaric acts of sabotage could only have been done by mentally – ill maniacs who blinded by ambition for promotion and greed, would not worry about unsettling the life of another human being and his/her family.
3. My health on Robben Island was not of the best and I am sure the climate did not suit me. Until late in the morning and already long before sundown the whole island would be enveloped by mist. A number of prisoners were ferried to a mainland hospital for nose operations. I, too, was in line for one in February 1972 but in late November 1971, three of us were transferred from Robben Island to Fort Glamorgan East London. We were in the back-seat of a car with our escorts in front.
4. After the Boland Mountains, the vegetation changed. 'Please stop' the car! I shouted. I opened the door and got out. 'If you run away, I'll shoot! What is it now?' Asked one of the policemen. 'Can you believe it? I can breathe through my nose!' The officers gave me more time to 'eat' the air through my nose before we resumed our journey.
5. There are ever so many things we take for granted. I have breathed fresh air since my birth but when this breathing came back after a few months' deprivation, it came back to me as a rare delicacy enjoyed only by kings and queens.

ADVERTISEMENTS

1. The large, expensive advertisements we come across in newspapers, on TV, over the radio and on posters and neon signs are usually messages from large corporations that try to persuade certain people, called a target group, to buy certain products or pay for certain services.
2. The wording of the advertisement will usually put pressure on the target group. Just look at advertisements for women's cosmetics, for example. The advertiser tries to convince women that they won't look beautiful if they don't use special creams and lotions, and their brand of cream is better than any other. This is why advertising is sometimes called 'the art of persuasion.'
3. Another type of advertisement is the smaller, less expensive advertisement placed in the 'small ads' or '**smalls**' in local newspapers. These do the same job as a notice board in your local library or supermarket.
4. They are aimed more at giving information than persuading or pressuring people into buying a product.
