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FOREWORD BY THE MEC FOR EDUCATION



Warm Greetings,

I feel very privileged to release this report on the National Senior Certificate Examinations. My heartfelt gratitude to the compilers of this report and to the people who administered these examinations, including schools, for the sterling work done. Indeed your good work is recognised and appreciated by the Provincial Government.

The report contains the results of the 2011 Grade 12 class, and compares them with the results of the three previous years (2008; 2009; 2010). The report also covers a realistic analysis of the critical subjects like Mathematics, Accounting, Physical Science, etc.

This (then) enables the reader to note concrete trends over these years and thus get a better and informed picture with regard to the Grade 12 performance in the Eastern Cape.

EXAMINATIONS

With high quality of question papers set by Department of Basic Education and quality assured by UMALUSI, the examination took place over a six weeks period.

Clean and smooth examinations were run over a six week period. This is a reputation that the Department has continued to build over the last ten years. We commit to keep a clean record of examinations in the Province, to build the confidence of our people.

MARKING

Marking was done in fifteen marking centres and these centres were visited by both the DBE and UMALUSI. Both DBE and UMALUSI monitors were highly impressed with the setup of the marking centres. The marking process took place over a period of two weeks. This two weeks period was characterised by clean and credible marking. Once again building on the good reputation of our Province.

CHALLENGES

The year 2011 can be classified as one of the most challenging years in the history of the Province.

The Department of Education in the Province started the 2011 academic year faced with:

- No School Nutrition.
- No Scholar Transport.
- 4249 temporary educators terminated in December 2010.
- No stationery for Section 20 schools.

These problems were mainly as a result of budget constraints, mismanagement and poor planning in some instances.

These problems also led to the intervention by National Government through Section 100(1)(b). However, through the support of the Provincial Government, the Department started to deal with these problems in the following manner:

- Implementation of new school nutrition model that resumed in March 2011.
- By a court-order, the re-instatement of the temporary educators by March 2011.
- Scholar transport, driven jointly by Department of Education and Department of Transport, resumed on 18 July 2011.
- Section 20 stationery was at Schools by July 2011.

It also took some months to have common understanding on the Implementation of Section 100(1)(b) by both Provincial Government and National Government. However, with the President coming in with a task team of five ministers and five MEC's, we began to see progress on the implementation of Section 100(1) (b).

Obviously all these problems and challenges impacted negatively on the delivery of education services and school functionality in particular.

However, by the third quarter, we began to see some progress in the delivery of education in the Province.

It is in this context and against this background that the NSC candidates of 2011 wrote the final examinations and against which the Education Department releases this report.

RESPONSIBILITIES

A learner stays in our education system for an average of thirteen years, starting at Grade R and culminating with Grade 12. The Annual National Assessment (ANA) and Grade 12 results have become critical tools to judge performance of both our system and our learners.

Through examinations, parents, villagers, government and communities should be able to determine the strengths and weaknesses of both learners and the system itself. This will go a long way in helping learners to prepare themselves for their historical responsibilities.

Learners and young people in schools and other institutions of learning have only one duty today, the duty of studying; studying should be seen as a social duty. By discharging that duty, learners shall be paying all debts they may have with society and the heroes/heroines who sacrificed to make possible this present society. All this sacrifice was made to dignify schools and higher institutions of learning in South Africa for poor people, both black and white.

Learners should study more and be better every day as we all walk towards a better future. The future needs technology, culture and knowledge. Self improvement on a day-to-day basis should become a necessity for all of us. Education, Science and Technology form an inseparable triad necessary for a country's development.

Our Education system must not only teach learners academic work but must also teach human values: generosity, modesty, simplicity, solidarity, and respect for humanity, selflessness, impatience for injustice, patience and courage.

To those who have passed the examinations, we say they must go on to utilise the opportunities opened up by our country to contribute in building a better life for our people.

To those who could not make it in 2011, we say they must not despair. To make a mistake is not a sin or disgrace. The sin is to repeat the mistake. By repeating matric you will have a better opportunity to deal with your mistake and improve your performance.

You must know that even great minds like Albert Einstein, the great scientist who is the father of the theory of relativity in physics, repeated his final high school year. He never committed suicide or dropped out of school, but committed himself to repeat and pass his final high school year.

CONCLUSION

We call upon learners, teachers, parents and communities to use this report as an instrument in improving performance, career-pathing and determining progress. It takes a village to raise a child.

Education remains a major contributor in dealing with poverty and economic development.

PREFACE BY THE HEAD: EDUCATION

Such excellent results do not come easily and are always the consequence of long hours of study, sacrifice on the part of parents, grandparents and other guardians, the diligence of teachers and the determination to excel on the part of the candidates themselves. All these are necessary and integral parts of success and I commend this formula to you all. I should like to convey my congratulations to all our top achievers and to wish them every success in their future careers.

There are also results about which we should feel less than pleased. It is not acceptable to any of us that some schools continue, year after year, to produce results less than the national pass rate for grade 12. It is true that many of these schools experience considerable challenges as regards qualified teachers, lack of resources and errant learners who often do not seem to want to learn. In essence, it is often noticeable in poorly-performing schools that the formula for success which I commended to you earlier, is nowhere in evidence. Teachers do not teach, learners are not willing to learn and parents are uninvolved.

This, however, does not in any way excuse poor results. There are ample examples of similarly challenged schools still producing excellent results on a consistent basis. It is incumbent upon us all to ensure that this deplorable state of affairs ceases forthwith and that we all intervene meaningfully to transform our schooling sector. You will notice I said the word "we". This is because I believe that all who have the interests of education in this province at heart must join hands and work together. Schools are integral parts of our community and provide an important service to those communities. It is a necessity therefore that communities own schools, work with principals and teachers and motivate their children to provide them with the best possible future.

Once more, my heartiest congratulations and best wishes to all our learners, their parents and teachers and my special love to all those who did not make it.
