Message from the Minister



I am deeply honoured to be acknowledging the efforts and sacrifices of the Class of 2020, who have persevered despite the immense odds and have emerged victorious. The learners that will be recognised for their sterling efforts, are representatives of the 578 468 candidates that sat for the 2020 National Senior Certificate examination, despite the doom and gloom. Each learner deserves a medal, for weathering the storm of fear and anxiety and finally writing the examination. Even those that have not attained the NSC, you have taken the first steps to attaining the NSC. You have achieved partial credits, which you could add to following our second chance programme.

The systemic trend of learner achievement of which this cohort has been a part of over the last 12 years was an upward trajectory. In 2009, the National Senior Certificate pass rate was 60% and 109 000 learners qualified for Bachelor admissions. In 2020, 76.2% of learners who wrote the National Senior Certificate examination passed and 210 820 of them achieved admission to Bachelor Studies. Over the last 10 years, the pass rate has remained consistently over 70% since reaching this benchmark in 2011. Internal analyses by the Department of Basic Education on the 2020 cohort indicated that the Grade 11 and Grade 10 results were higher than their counterparts of the 2019 cohort. The predictive analysis pointed to a continued upward trend in 2020. But we did not expect the system to be faced with a devastating pandemic that engrossed education systems, teaching and learning, parents and learners across the world into crisis. This unfortunately impacted on the performance of the Class of 2020.

A total of 578 468 full-time candidates sat for the 2020 NSC examinations. The overall pass rate for the 2020 cohort represents a decrease of 5.1 percentage points from 81.3% in 2019. Although there is decrease in the pass percentage, there has been a notable increase in the number of learners that attained the National Senior Certificate. The decrease in performance is notably sharper in provinces that have a significant rural constituency and is less pronounced in provinces with more urban settings. This may be ascribed to the COVID-19 pandemic conditions having a greater impact on schooling in rural areas and their constrained ability to re-organise and regain lost learning time due to school closures, learner absenteeism, teacher well-being, and access to resources.

The achievement of the Class of 2020 should be acknowledged with due respect to the fallen heroes of education sector. In the past year, the sad loss of teachers and officials who succumbed to the pandemic has robbed learners, families, the education sector and society of a multitude of individual talents, skills, dedication, and commitment that served generations of South African children from early learning to adolescence. The contribution of these “soldiers of learning”, many of whom invested into the achievements of the Class of 2020 will be forever remembered. In light of this I thank parents, teachers, principals, teacher unions, communities, district and provincial officials, and social partners for supporting the Class of 2020.

This brochure commemorates the Class of 2020 and I want to reassure this class that you will be remembered for years to come as the class of grit, tenacity and perseverance

The Class of 2020

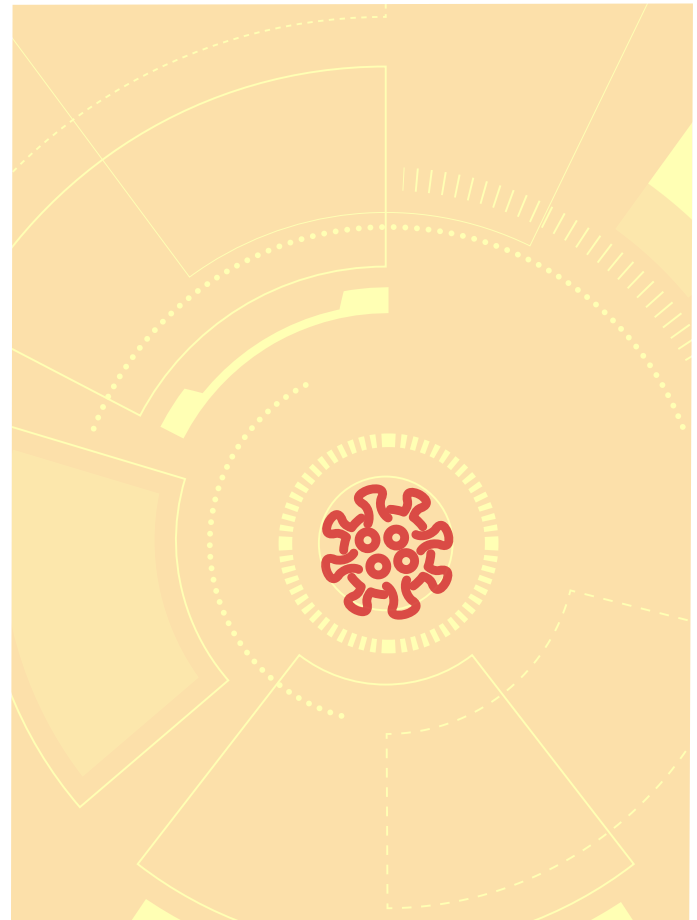
The Class of 2020 is the seventh cohort to be exposed to the Curriculum Assessment Policy Statement (CAPS). Hence, we can infer that this class benefitted from the developments of the last seven years relating to CAPS, which would have created a high degree of stability in the system with regard to the teaching, learning and assessment.

These learners are also the beneficiaries of the educational transformation that heralded the move towards a technologically enhanced curriculum. The Class of 2020 is the third cohort to offer a series of new subjects in the Grade 12 NSC examinations. These include South African Sign Language at Home Language level (SASL HL), Technical Mathematics, Technical Sciences, Civil Technology (Construction /Civil Services/ Woodworking), Electrical Technology (Digital Systems/Electronic/ Power Systems) and Mechanical Technology (Automotive/Fitting and Machining/Welding and Metal Work)..

In a bid to ensure that the examinations at the Grade 12 level are more reflective of the scope of the subject, the number of question papers in Accounting and Business Studies have been changed to two. This will allow the learners to be examined on specific aspects of the curriculum in Paper 1 and Paper 2 and hence their preparation is more focussed and also this approach allows learners more time to be tested in the individual papers. This group was the first cohort to be exposed to this new paper format.

In 2019, the policy on Multiple Examination opportunity was discontinued, which implies that the learners that are progressed in 2020, will not be allowed to write their subjects over two years as their counterparts in previous years. This may be regarded as a disadvantage to the progressed learners but it may also be regarded as a stimulant to motivate learners to apply themselves more seriously knowing that they will be subjected to a full examination at the end of the year.

The Grade 12 candidates of 2020, were unfortunately subjected to a myriad of challenges, brought about by the Covid-19 pandemic. This resulted in the national lockdown and the disruption to schooling. Despite all efforts by the Department to insulate the Grade 12 class of 2020, from the ill-effects of the pandemic and to grant them maximum exposure to face to face teaching and learning, the challenges posed by the pandemic impacted significantly on the teaching and learning programmes, contact time, access to information etc.

Graph 1: Comparison of NSC performance 2008 to 2020

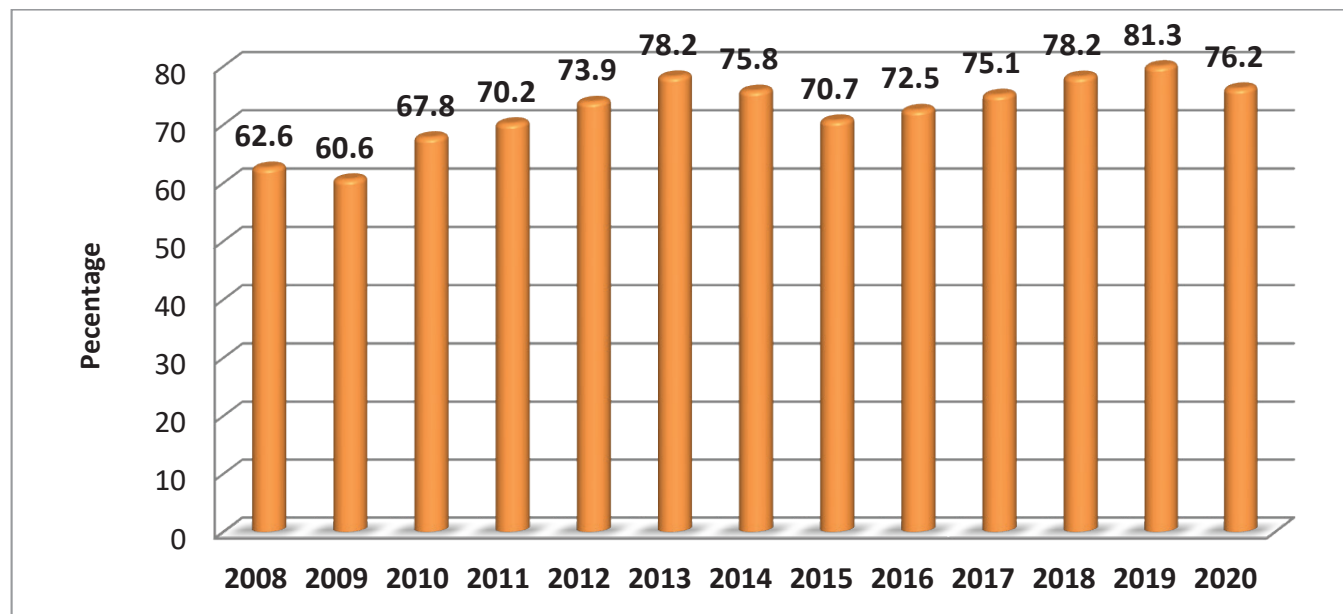

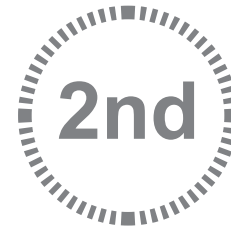


Daniel Johannes Emmenis

Blessing Mlambo

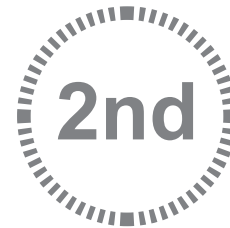

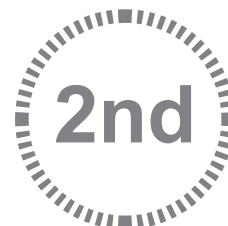

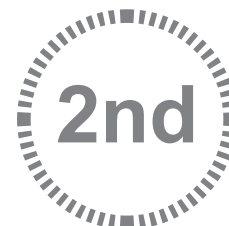


Reynhardt Buys

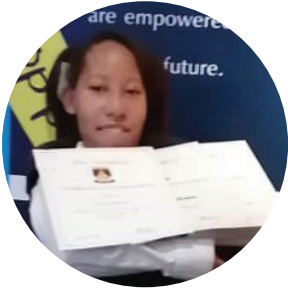

Important information

Re-checking and Re-marking of scripts

- a) Learners who are not satisfied with their subject results for the National Senior Certificate have until 26 March 2021 to register for re-marking, re-checking or viewing of the script.
- b) Application forms for re-checking and re-marking are available at the District offices and the schools and centres where candidates sat for the examination.
- c) The fees (per subject) are:
 - Re-mark: R120
 - Re-Check: R29
 - Viewing: R234
- d) Viewing of scripts may be done only after the re-mark or re-check of results. The closing date for applications is 7 days after the release of re-mark or re-check results.
- e) Candidates from no-fee schools, and learners whose parents have applied for and have been granted a concession on the payment of schools fees, are exempted from payment of fees for re-marking and re-checking.

Withheld results

Why are my results withheld?

Results are withheld because of irregularities.

What could I do if my results are withheld?

- a) Contact your school or district office to request reasons for the withholding of the results.
- b) Appeal in writing if your results are withheld.

May/June examinations

A second opportunity is granted to all candidates that have written the 2020 Combined November examinations, to improve their results in the June 2021 examination. This applies to candidates that have passed but want to improve their results, as well as candidates that were not successful. The only criterion to write the June 2021 examination are the following:

- a) The candidate must have registered for 2020 Combined November examination.
- b) Candidates can only register for subjects registered for in the 2020 Combined November examination.

Candidates who were absent in the Combined 2020 November examination, will also be allowed to write the 2021 June examination, provided they have a valid reason for being absent. In the case where a candidate misses one or more papers in the November examination with a valid reason, the candidate has the choice whether to write only the incomplete papers or the entire subject (all written papers).

What is the closing date for application?

The closing date for applications to register for the 2021 June examination is 26 March 2020 for both manual and on-line registrations.

Where and when do candidates register?

Registration is done by a candidate immediately after receiving his/her results and at the centre where he/she sat for the examination.

Where could I access the NSC Examination Timetable for June 2021?

The timetable could be downloaded at www.education.gov.za.

Alternative options

Candidates who do not qualify to write the May/June 2021 examination, have the following options:

- a) Re-enrol for the NSC at a school, provided that the candidate is younger than 21 years of age.
- b) Register as a part-time candidate at a Public Adult Education Centre, provided that the candidate is older than 21 years of age.
- c) Register for vocational education and training at a Further Education and Training college.

Second Chance Matric Programme

The aim of the Second Chance Matric Programme is to provide support to learners who have not met the requirements of the October/November examination or May/June examination and may want to improve their results.

Requirements for further studies

The minimum requirements for a candidate to obtain an NSC are that a candidate should achieve 40% in three subjects, one of which is an official language at Home Language level, and 30% in three subjects.

What are the requirements to be admitted to a tertiary institution?

(a) Higher Certificate

The minimum admission requirement is a National Senior Certificate with a minimum of 30% in the language of teaching and learning of the higher education institution as certified by Umalusi. Institutional and programme needs may require additional combinations or recognised NSC subjects and levels of achievement.

(b) Diploma

The minimum admission requirement is the National Senior Certificate with a minimum of 30% in the language of learning and teaching of the higher education institution as certified by Umalusi, coupled with an achievement rating of 3 (moderate achievement, 40% - 49%) or better in four recognised 20-credit subjects. Institutional and programme needs may require additional combinations of recognised NSC subjects and levels of achievement.

(c) Bachelor's Degree

To meet the minimum admission requirements to a Bachelor's Degree study at a higher education institution, a candidate must obtain, in addition to the National Senior Certificate, an achievement rating of 4 (Adequate Achievement, 50% - 59%) or better in four subjects.
